# OUR CHILDREN'S LIBRARY



When Nathan Willard left last October, he presented a gift to our children: *Children of God: Storybook Bible* by Archbishop Desmond Tutu.

In this 128 page book, paired with two audio CDs of the complete book, Desmond Tutu retells 56 of his most beloved Bible stories. He artfully highlights God's desire for all people to love one another and to find peace and forgiveness in their hearts.

Many of the finest artists from around the world have been selected to illustrate the stories. In an attempt to create the first truly global Bible for children, the artists have been invited to portray the stories with the style and richness of their own culture. Their stunning color illustrations allow readers to more fully experience the Bible stories—with Adam and Eve in the garden, with Noah on the ark, with Abraham in the desert, and with Jesus on the mountaintop.

Every story paraphrases the Biblical text and ends with a short prayer. Archbishop Tutu's wisdom, compassion, and sense of humor shine throughout, as he reminds us that "We are all God's children."

"From the moment I opened this children's Bible, I knew I liked it! The table of contents displays the clear titles (no guessing which story you want), Bible reference, and page number. The fifty-six stories included in this children's Bible all point to the gift of God's love for children everywhere. The stories themselves are well-written and include enough details to help a child learn the actual Bible story. (For example, in "The Trial and Death of Jesus" the Garden of Gethsemane is named as where Jesus was praying, and it explains that Pontius Pilate was the Roman ruler.) The recommended ages for this Bible are 4–7, but some younger children may enjoy this. Each story (and illustration) is over a two page spread. There is a main title and then a subtitle explaining how it relates to God. (For "Jonah and the Big Fish" the subtitle is "God loves everyone, even our enemies" with the reference Jonah 1–4.) Each ends with a short prayer. . . . The illustrations are amazing, and this Bible has twenty illustrators! They were invited by Archbishop Tutu to portray the stories with the style and richness of their own cultures. Though that means Jesus may look different from one page to another. Also, because the illustrators reflected their own cultures, Jesus is sometimes dark skinned and other times pale. . . . I do recommend this Bible!"—A. Whipple

Please feel free to look over all the selections in our church library. We have many books of interest to children, older youth, and adults.

# PILGRIM HEIGHTS CAMP & RETREAT CENTER

## A bit of history -

For nearly 60 years the Iowa Conference of the Congregational Churches and then the United Church of Christ have owned the Pilgrim Heights Retreat Center in Tama County, Iowa. In 2007, Our Sacred Space, Inc. (a non-profit organization) was formed to manage and build the camp and retreat programming. 50% of the Our Sacred Space, Inc. (OSSI) board must be UCC members. In 2008 the ownership of the property, including timber and a 60 acre lake, was transferred to OSSI. Our Sacred Space, Inc. is an entity separate from the Iowa Conference of the United Church of Christ. The Iowa Conference contributes \$10,000 annually to OSSI to help offset the cost of the camping program. The cost to maintain the site and programming for one day is \$500. It is common knowledge that church camps in general are not able to remain financially viable by only offering a summer camping program. For this reason, Pilgrim Heights relies on financial donations and volunteerism and is also available as a venue to other events to create income: weddings, retreats, reunions, day camps, meetings. The facility was recently accredited by the American Camping Association in 2013. Pilgrim Heights is complete with lodges, rustic cabins, A/C dining hall, and modern lodging. Hiking, fishing, boating and swimming are some of the popular activities at camp. Pilgrim Heights is located on Hwy. 30 west of Tama.

## Summer Camp -

It is time now to go out (without our high tech stuff) and enjoy nature and experience God's world. Please take a look at the Pilgrim Heights poster in Rockwood Hall. (You may even see pictures of some of our church family from years past!) There is a camp for everyone. You can experience camp for one day or up to a week. There are many options and themes. Brochures are available in Rockwood Hall.

## A Day of Discovery & Dedication –

This event will be held on Saturday, May 3 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Pilgrim Heights. This is an opportunity for those who wish to Discover Pilgrim Heights or to renew their dedication to Pilgrim Heights as visitors. You can explore and see what the camp has to offer through several information stations. This would be a fun day trip for the family and/or friends. Brochures are available in Rockwood Hall.

## Spring Work Weekend –

This event will be held Friday, April 25 through Sunday, April 27. A variety of projects is waiting for eager volunteers to help prepare the facility for the summer camping season. **CONGREGATIONAL UCC RECEIVES GIFT FROM THE HALE ESTATE**

At the close of 2013, the church was notified that Charles and Lenore Hale had named the church as a beneficiary of their Charitable Remainder Trust. The Hales were long time members of this congregation from 1966 until they moved to Seattle in 2004. Charles retired from the University of Iowa History Department, and Lennie had served the university as a social worker. They raised their four children in the church and thoughtfully named the church to receive a gift at the time of their deaths. Charles was instrumental in drafting endowment policy for the church when he served as an early member of the Endowment Committee. Charles passed away in 2008 and Lennie on October 5, 2013. The church received the estate gift, and the money has been placed in the Hale Fund until decisions are made about its future use.
