Friends in Christ—

As I write this, the Supreme Court is hearing arguments on the issue of marriage equality. Their decision on whether or not to extend the right to marry to all people regardless of sexual orientation is not expected until late June.

Six years ago the Iowa Supreme Court handed down its decision extending equal marriage rights to all people in Iowa. Shortly after that decision, I told our Church Council that my assumption was that marriage in our sanctuary would be open to all people. That was the assumption and the decision of the Council members as well. Since then ceremonies in that holy place have given witness to the fact that while marriage is indeed between a man and a woman, it is also between a man and a man and it is also between a woman and a woman and all marriages entered into responsibly and prayerfully are blessed by God.

This congregation, of course, has been openly supportive of marriage for all people for a long time. In 2001 my predecessor, the Rev. Bruce Fischer, officiated at a ceremony in our sanctuary uniting Braydon Hayes and Jake Pepples in marriage. It wasn't recognized by the State of Iowa at the time, but it was recognized in the eyes of God. Since the Iowa Supreme Court decision in 2008, several of our gay and lesbian members have been married here.

The couples that come to be married here are a diverse group of people: older couples who have been together for years, even decades, and younger couples just starting out in adult life; some have been parents for many years and now their children have the stability of married parents; some have had children since getting married and joyfully brought them here for baptism; some are surrounded by their families, some are estranged from their families; some are members of this congregation, others are not.

As a congregation, we have proved what we believed to be the case all along: opening marriage to all people has renewed us and strengthened us in living out our faith even as it has improved the quality of life for so many in Iowa City and throughout our state. Again and again, new members say that one of the reason they joined this church is because of our open and affirming commitments.

While I hope that the US Supreme Court will recognize the constitutional right of all people to marry, I will have one small regret when this happens. I will miss the opportunities for getting to know the wonderful people who come to Iowa City to get married. For six years I have answered phone calls from countless couples asking hesitantly, "Could we get married at your church." When they heard, "Yes. That's possible," there was relief and joy. I've had the chance to meet people from neighboring states, across the Midwest, and as far away as Texas, who have been married in our sanctuary. It has been (and you know I don't use the word lightly) a blessing for them, for me, and for this congregation. I'll miss that. But I hope that soon all people can marry whom they choose in the places they choose.

## **CHURCH HISTORY PROJECT**

A number of members of our congregation are interested in compiling a history for the upcoming 150th anniversary of our church building in 2017. This is the kind of project to which many people can contribute a piece, and the resulting whole can help us all to look into our past and move forward in the context of what's preceded us.

Any large scale effort needs leadership. Bryan Clemons, Randee and John Fieselmann, and Donna Hirst plan to meet monthly or as needed to act as a steering committee for this effort. Diana Coberly and Martha Ann Crawford will be assisting as they are able. We would like one additional person to be willing to assume a leadership role in the effort. The leadership group will define preferred outcomes, identify available resources (people, documents, oral histories, etc.), and determine timelines and benchmarks. It is likely the steering committee members will each have responsibility for oversight of discrete aspects of the effort. None of those involved have “time to spare”, so meetings will be short and business will be conducted by email as necessary. A project website has been created to assist in coordinating the effort. ## **FELLOWSHIP HOUR - EQUAL EXCHANGE FAIRLY TRADED COFFEE**

Many of us enjoy a cup of coffee after church downstairs in Rockwood Hall. The Choir and Adult Education attendees enjoy it a little earlier in the day, too! We purchase our Fellowship Blend coffee in bulk from the Equal Exchange Fairly Traded program, and it is more expensive than standard brand. That's why you see a basket with a yellow sign on the serving table downstairs for donations to offset this cost. We enjoy the coffee and support a good cause at the same time.

The Equal Exchange program works with local farmers and co-ops in many countries to obtain great coffee that benefits these growers directly. The Mission Board started our program and we support it not as a fundraiser, but as a direct purchaser to help this program. We use the coffee on Sunday, at church meetings, and we sell it to our congregation via our monthly Equal Exchange sales of coffee, tea, and chocolate sales after church. Please thank Martha Ann Crawford, our very own barista, for coordinating this effort. You will often see Chuck and Robert helping out too. Please consider contributing to our support of local farmers and co-ops around the world by dropping some change (or bills) in the coffee basket on Sundays!

## **KIRKWOOD ADULT LITERACY PROGRAM NEEDS TUTORS**

The guest speaker during our Adult Education Class on April 19th was Kassia Scott. She shared information with us about the need in our community for tutors in the Kirkwood Adult Literacy Program. Tutors provide valuable one-on-one assistance for students as they improve their English language skills, improve their basic literacy skills or work toward a high school diploma or practice their English Conversation skills.

There is no charge to students for this service. Most tutors meet with their student one hour per week for 6 to 8 weeks. All tutors must be at least 18 years of age and have a high school diploma. No previous experience is necessary. Currently, there is a three month waiting period for people who want tutors. Once an application is received, an interview will be scheduled with you. During the interview you will review tutoring materials and strategies and discuss a possible student match for you.

Johnson County does not have a Hospice Home available for end of life care, even though there are 16 homes in Iowa. This proposed home will serve persons who do not have a primary caregiver who can do the difficult job of care at home. It will provide long term relief for caregivers who are exhausted as they strive compassionately to care for their loved ones. It will provide an alternative to nursing home care for final days. This book depicts the experiences of descendants of slaves who worked as domestic servants in the segregated South from the 1920's to the 1960's. The book goes farther following some of the African American women and their families who migrated to Iowa, many of them to Waterloo.

The "Women of the Great Migration", along with husbands and families, were among some 6 million black southerners who moved North as more occupational opportunities became available as cheap labor decreased in the South. These migrants often found better paying jobs in the North but also learned that some racial division persisted there too. Yet it was in Iowa and in Midwestern cities that blacks began to feel less dependent on individual whites, and they became more clearly citizens and agents of their own lives.

"The Maid Narratives" includes much historical research and content. The most compelling of which, are the interviews with dozens of housekeepers, caretakers, and cooks who share good and bad memories of the South as well as Iowa.

The 3 co-authors of "The Maid Narratives" all have Iowa ties and personal links to their subject matter, and they are responsible for the interviews contained in this book. Katherine Van Wormer (white southerner cared for by black women) is a sociologist and professor of social work at UNI. David W. Jackson III (black and born in Des Moines) previous generations worked as domestics in the South and in Des Moines. Jackson is assistant professor in the Dept. Of African American Studies at Metropolitan State College of Denver. Charletta Sudduth (black whose mother worked as a domestic and cotton picker in the South) is childhood consultant in the Waterloo School District.

"The Maid Narratives" was published by Louisiana State Univ Press in 2012.
