Friends in Christ—

Recently I was talking with someone at church about downtown Iowa City. She had been downtown on that beautiful, April 17 Sunday. The sun was shining. Crowds of people - families, couples, groups, individuals of all ages were out enjoying the day. The stores were open. The restaurants were busy. Even the construction on Washington Street didn't keep people away. I was over at the Northside Marketplace that same afternoon and it was hopping as well.

When I arrived nearly nine years ago, the downtown often felt almost deserted on the weekend. Now Sunday has become a great day to be downtown. Maybe you've noticed this. The Press Citizen reported on this change back in October. In an article titled, "Iowa City's Sunday Scene Gaining Downtown Popularity," one business owner was quoted saying: "We love Sunday. Sunday is the new Saturday, and it's amazing. A lot of people work six days a week now and Sunday is often the only free day that people have for themselves."

Here at Congregational UCC we love Sunday, too, and for quite a while we've known how great Sunday can be. Still, the revitalization of downtown Iowa City is something to celebrate. Our commitment to stay on our corner means that we are now a vibrant, intergenerational church in the midst of a vibrant, intergenerational area.

In April our membership board discussed an interview with Haydn Shaw on the need for churches to improve their "generational IQ." Pointing to the reality that for the first time, many congregations, including our own, are made up of five generations of people, Shaw said, "You've got older people who are living longer and want to know how to make an impact on their retirement. You've got younger people who are wanting somebody in addition to their parents that they can go to, and think out loud with, and sort through all the new choices that previous generations didn't have and didn't have to make."

And he is addressing us when he says that it's now important to ask, what do "we have to do differently so that they would find us a place of spiritual health and help?" That's a good question for us as spring takes hold and we look toward a summer that surrounds us with art and music and food and people of all ages hoping for some good news. I think the answers will be found as we talk together in this exciting, lively place.

Each year in May we recognize high school graduates in our congregation. This year, Abby Whittaker will graduate from City High and will be attending Clarke University in Dubuque in the fall. As for the future, I will be seeking approval for "ordination pending call" from the Eastern Iowa Association Committee on Ministry. 

A steering committee (composed of Bryan Clemons, John and Randy Fieselmann, Donna Hirst, and Pam Willard) and subject-area committees have been formed to do the work of this endeavor. Excellent progress is being made in extracting significant information from our "archives" (ie: past annual reports and meeting minutes). The book is planned to be a narrative account, using stories from members to illustrate the extensive undertakings and perspectives of this church in our community.

Steering committee members are carrying out in-depth interviews with a number of church members. Those selected so far are people with a long history in the church, having attended and been involved for many years. Others being interviewed are those who have been particularly active with some aspect(s) of church operations, possibly over a shorter time period.

The steering committee recognizes that we may have overlooked some of you whose memories and insights, if shared, would make valuable contributions to the information being collected. Some people are excellent observers who could add interesting points of view.
