Friends in Christ:

We are moving through the season of Lent toward an early celebration of Easter on Sunday, March 31. And what a happy opportunity we have this year as we listen to the Sermon on the Mount together in many different ways. In worship, in study, in daily reflections we're finding the good news that, as Amy-Jill Levine puts it, "We are wondrous creatures with unlimited potential. We already have the gifts needed to live into the kingdom of heaven."

Of course, it wouldn't be Lent if I didn't encourage and even exhort you to give generously to our One Great Hour of Sharing Offering on Palm Sunday, March 24. The need for money to fund medical care, disaster relief, and especially, relief for refugees has never been greater.

If you have already decided how much you are going to give, double that amount. If you haven't yet decided, surprise yourself—shock yourself, even—with how generous you can be. When you write that check you should be asking, "What am I thinking, giving this much?"

Parents, help your children to give using those banks that we handed out. It's hard to talk with children about other children who are suffering, but many of your children are aware of this already. Gently help them to see how they can help others.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus gets around to talking about money. He always seems to get around to talking about money—and always in ways that help us find the good news. Jesus invites us to wisely use what we have and to let go of whatever it is that holds us captive or impoverishes us. Sharing what we have can help us to better see the image of God in each human being.

Take some time this month to remember all the doors that have been opened for you, all that has been shared with you, and all the help that you have received to get to where you are today. Great need now meets your great abundance. How do you want to respond?

On Palm Sunday, March 24, we will dedicate our One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) offering. This offering has long been an important part of the life of our congregation. For many years now, we have been on the list of Top 50 giving churches.

One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) involves us in disaster, refugee/immigration, and development ministries throughout the world. When a disaster strikes or people are displaced or made refugees by violence or extreme poverty, through our offering, we are part of the immediate response and of the long-term recovery.

Through OGHS we engage in holistic development programs including health care, education, agriculture, food sustainability, micro-financing and women's empowerment. Because the UCC relates in mutual partnership to churches and organizations through Global Ministries and worldwide response & recovery networks, our contributions to One Great Hour of Sharing put us in the right place at the right time for the relief, accompaniment, and recovery of the most vulnerable. We meet immediate needs and you address the underlying causes that create those needs in the first place.

WE'RE STILL LEARNING

Continuing our historic congregational and UCC commitment to be welcoming, opening, and affirming to all, the Mission Board created an LGBTQ+ subcommittee last year to address making that historic commitment real in the present day. Our first activity was to develop an appropriate logo and banner for our significant presence in the June 2023 Iowa City Pride Festival.



As the subcommittee met in the fall to assess the most effective way to expand and reinforce this church's leader-ship status, it became clear that the issue is an emerging, ever evolving challenge. Repeatedly it was recognized that we are still learning and there is much to learn and do. This realization grew into the **We're Still Learning** series organized by the Mission Board to increase understanding, advocacy and commitment to timely and timeless LGBTQ+ issues. Four members of our congregation attended a lobbying day in Des Moines in early February to focus on the specific threatening legislative proposals.

The **We're Still Learning** series kick-off took place at an after-worship service potluck on February 18. David McCartney, a member of our congregation and Archivist Emeritus of the University of Iowa, presented "A Brief Look at History of LGBTQ Life in Iowa City." His presentation was appreciated by the more than 50 congregation members attending and all were surveyed for future ideas of impact going forward. The results showed an overwhelming interest in keeping informed on legislative developments targeting the LGBTQ+ community in order to advocate and help prevent onerous proposed bills from being voted into law. In keeping with that interest, there will be information inserts in the Sunday bulletin during the legislative session and you will find postings on the special bulletin board in Rockwood Hall. Please check the inserts and bulletin board to see how you can help! While the focus for the next month remains on the legislative threats and Des Moines activity, plans are underway for a second in the **We're Still Learning** series tentatively scheduled for mid-May. And it's time to get the June 15, 2024, Iowa City Pride Fest on your calendar. There will be multiple opportunities to join the celebration in the parade or in the booth, including special tee shirts to tell everyone who we are!

We are all still learning together!

NEW BOOKS FROM CONGREGATIONAL UCC MEMBERS

Megan Carnes' debut novel, *The Celdan Heresies*, will be published on Wednesday, March 6. Annie Dillard says of this book: "Megan Carnes has written a work of startling imagination. 
an integral part of the rich tapestry of Black history. Your 'Excellence' resonates strongly through the voices you amplify and the thriving culture you help cultivate.
