SABBATICAL NEWS AND MORE

Friends in Christ:

The summer months always bring new opportunities and a change of pace. This month, Congregational UCC will hold and take part in some traditional June activities. We're not really slowing down, but there are many opportunities to enjoy the good things that June offers us as we worship and work and play together.

On Sunday, June 2, eight young people will be confirmed and welcomed into membership in our congregation. They have been preparing for this day since last fall, studying and talking together, serving at Hop Lodge, leading the Easter Sunrise Service, and participating in a prayer retreat. This will be a morning of joyful celebration and a time to look toward the future of the church.

On June 9, we will begin our observance of Pride Week. You'll be able to preview plans, posters, tee shirts, signs and giveaways that will be part of the Congregational United Church of Christ of Iowa City parade vehicle and booth. There will be special refreshments in keeping with the Pride theme. Then we'll join with others in the Pride Parade and Festival on Saturday, June 15.

On June 16, we'll observe Juneteenth during worship. We have done this for a few years now, but not for as long as the day has been recognized in Iowa (that started in 2002). Our hymns, prayers, scripture lessons, and sermon will guide us in this commemoration in preparation for the national holiday on June 19.

In the afternoon of June 23, we'll gather in City Park for our annual church picnic. This is a relaxed, beginning-of-summer event that brings people of all ages together for conversation, laughter, and, of course, food. Bring games, bring musical instruments, bring your friends, and we'll have a great time.

By the time June 30 rolls around, who knows what else we might be doing. June 30 will be my last Sunday in worship until August.

During the month of July, I will be on a "mini-sabbatical." I will be using this month to begin some writing about preaching that I have wanted to do for some time. We continue to be in a very positive time of rebuilding. This summer we will bring on a new staff person for Christian education. So, it is not the right time for me to take the usual three-month sabbatical right now. But one month will allow me to get started on this project and give me a good sense of what I will need to do next. This will most likely be followed up with further sabbatical time in 2025.

MAUI WILDFIRE RECOVERY UPDATE

In early August 2023, a series of wildfires devastated Hawaii, predominantly on the island of Maui. These wind-fueled blazes led to evacuations, extensive destruction, and claimed about 100 lives, leaving some individuals unaccounted for in Lahaina on Maui's northwest shore. The escalation of the wildfires was linked to the dry, gusty conditions arising from a high-pressure system north of Hawaii and the presence of Hurricane Dora to the south.

In response to the devastation, the Hawaii Conference adopted a matrix of data points that they believe helped to guide them into best practices and engagement with partners in responding to the Maui fires. They have been told it will be 1.5 - 2 years before rebuilding can begin and with the damage in Lahaina, they anticipate a 7- to 10-year process.

Congregational UCC gave \$1800 to help with relief and rebuilding. By the fall of 2023, \$400,000 had been received for Maui relief efforts.

The Hawaii Conference UCC response plan includes 1) a three-year commitment of intentional support from Maui clergy that consists of counseling, peer groups, and paid time off; 2) an emerging needs focus that will assist with rental payments, down payments on new cars, food and water security, and economic support for families, individuals, and the Maui economy through the purchase and distribution of gift cards and gas cards; and 3) long-term recovery work that is approximately 1.5 - 2 years ahead.

They are also projecting recovery work to include temporary housing, while continuing to utilize the work of local congregations, as they assess needs in their areas. The Conference aims to be proactive with unmet needs that other groups are not set up to meet, such as assistance with home furnishings, once the homes are rebuilt.

THE REV. ANN MOLSBERRY RETIRES MAJESTY CONSTABLE GRADUATES AND MOVES

During worship on Pentecost Sunday, we celebrated the ministry of Ann Molsberry as she retired.

Ann began her professional career in 1976, with a three-year stint in Guatemala with the Peace Corps. This started one month after her wedding at the Congregational Church. Then, while Bob attended Divinty School, Ann earned an Assistant in Christian Education degree at Hartford Seminary and was hired as C.E. Director at Church of the Redeemer, UCC, in New Haven, CT. At various times she served as a CE director in Illinois and Iowa and was honored by the United Church of Christ at General Synod in Kansas City in 2001 as the national Christian Educator of the Year.

In 2008 she earned her Master of Divinity Degree at Eden Theological Seminary in St. Louis. She served as a pastor in churches in Ohio, Missouri, and Iowa. Finally, her career came to, as one person called it, a "gentle landing" at here at Congregational UCC as Director of Children's Programs.

Ann started here in 2019 and quickly had to shift gears in 2020—leading a vital online program that keep people connected and provided some stability and assurance to children and families in a very unstable time. As the children in the church school grew, she helped establish new programs for youth even as she continued the high-quality programs for children. Although we are sad to have Ann leave, she is leaving us in very good shape with a strong Christian Education program.

We celebrate all the good gifts that Ann has brought to her ministry in so many places—and especially here. We give great thanks to God for her work among us. And we wish her well as she moves into retirement.

Also on May 19, Majesty Constable finished two years as our Children's Choir Director, having graduated with two majors earlier in May. She is moving to Des Moines, where she will teach. Majesty led the children in singing a song that they had written, "UC, IC, UCCIC."






CONGRATULATIONS TO IZZY BROWN

How does the media shape racial issues and ultimately our beliefs and behaviors?



The nature of racial ideology has changed in our society. Yes, there are still ugly racists who push uglier racism, but there are also popular constructions of race routinely woven into mediated images and messages. Racialism includes, but moves beyond traditional racism. It involves images, ideas, and issues that are produced, distributed, and consumed repetitively and intertextually based on stereotypes, biased framing, historical myths, as well as traditional racism. These representations are normalized through the media, ultimately shaping and influencing societal ideology and behavior. Based on 25 years of research by Dr. Venise Berry, this documentary explores the connection between media, African Americans, and popular culture. Venise is a professor in Journalism and African American Studies at the University of Iowa in Iowa City. Steven Berry is a professor emeritus from Howard University's film department. The Juneteenth Celebration will be an evening of family-friendly entertainment with various attractions such as the Iowa City Public Library's Bookmobile and The Iowa Children's Museum. Additionally, vendor booths will offer arts, crafts, and merchandise, while informational booths will showcase local nonprofits and service agencies. Feel free to bring a lawn chair or blanket to relax or dance the night away with help from our musical entertainers.

This year's Juneteenth celebration is a collaboration between many community organizations: Johnson County Government, Think Iowa City, the City of Iowa City, Summer of the Arts, Iowa City Pride, Neighborhood Centers of Johnson County, Dream City, the Iowa City Downtown District, the Wright House of Fashion, the Community Foundation of Johnson County, Royceann's Soul Food, and the Black Voices Project.

Juneteenth commemorates the end of slavery in the United States. On June 19, 1865, two-and-a-half years after the Emancipation Proclamation, Union soldiers sailed into Galveston, Texas, and read aloud the order, freeing a quarter of a million slaves who were residing in the state.
