WATCH OUT FOR EMAIL AND TEXT SCAMS

In November, several members received a text stating it was from "Rev. William Lovin" and asking them for a favor—apparently buying some gift cards. This is a common scam that has previously targeted some of our members, as well as members of other congregations.

Please know that Bill will never send anyone a text or an email asking for a "favor," for gift cards, or the like. Always check the email address before replying to suspicious emails; if it is-

n't from "@uccic.org," it is a fake email address. And the main phone number Bill uses is the church's landline: 319-337-4301. Any other number with a suspicious request is another indication of a scam.



EPIPHANY CELEBRATION ON JANUARY 5.

Epiphany (the revelation of Jesus to the Gentiles, the coming of the Magi) falls twelve days after Christmas, on January 6 each year. This year we'll celebrate Epiphany on Sunday, January 5. In our 10:15 worship service we will bring our observance of Christmas to a conclusion, hearing the story of the Magi from the Gospel of Matthew and celebrating the sacrament of communion.

THE MISSION BOARD ANNUAL ALTERNATIVE GIVING FAIR was a great success - due to you, our buyers, sellers, and volunteer church members. Thank you to the creative people who offered their work: Jo Benda, Robin Chambers, Martha Ann Crawford, and Hope Spragg. Thank you to Kathy Fait and John Fuller for continuing their Share the Harvest through a cold autumn season. Thank you to Ginny Clemons for her lovely calligraphy on the Heifer cards. Thank you to our other volunteers at the tables: Chuck Dayton, Jane Kinney,

Linda Muston, and Julie Wittig. And a big thank you to John and Sharyn Reitz for coordinating all of this. The result? We sent over \$3,250to the Heifer Project, exceeding all previous years, and \$382 to Church World Service. Locally, we sent \$820 from the craft sales and \$1051.95 from Share the Harvest to the CommUnity Food Bank, and \$257.50 to the Immigrant Welcome Network – a total of \$4,636.45 going out into the community and the larger world.

CHRISTMAS FUND OFFERING UPDATE: We've received over \$2,000 for the Christmas Fund . Thanks again for your generous giving! Each year, the United Church of Christ's Christmas Fund Offering allows the UCC to assist retired pastors living on limited incomes as well as to supplement small retirement annuities and health premiums and to provide emergency grants to active and retired clergy and lay employees. The mission of the Christmas Fund is to provide assistance dollars in situations of critical need, while preserving the dignity of those who receive the aid. There

Results of the Fall Diaper Drive for CommUnity Food Bank

Thanks to everyone who participated in the fall diaper drive for CommUnity Food Bank. Through your donations and efforts, over 2000 diapers and 40 packages of baby wipes were collected and delivered to the Food Bank. The church also received \$195 in donations that the Mission Board used to purchase additional diapers which helped extend our

diaper deliveries into November and December. By supporting this drive, you made a difference in our community and in the lives of many local families in need.

WHAT'S IN STORE FOR THE IOWA LEGISLATURE THIS UPCOMING SESSION?

The Mission Board LGBTQ Subcommittee is continuing the "We Are Still Learning" series Sunday, January 12, 2025. **Senator Zach Wahls** will give a preview of the upcoming state legislature session for everyone interested during an expanded coffee hour in Rockwood Hall at 11:30. Senator Wahls represents Senate District 43 which includes Coralville, North Liberty, Solon and part of western Iowa City and rural northeast Johnson County. Zach has served in this post since 2018. The West High, University of Iowa, and Princeton grad lives in Coralville with his wife Chloe and their son Elijah.

Zach grew up in a non-traditional family and has served as an advocate for Iowans who do not always have a voice. He is widely respected for sharing his experiences with a bestselling book, presentations, and continued advocacy for LGBTQ people. He will share with us the major issues anticipated in the next legislative session and include the special concerns for threatened populations.
