#### Friends in Christ:

As January came to an end, and our nation was reeling in the tumultuous post-inauguration days, there was a lot of talk about the plea for mercy from Episcopalian bishop, the Right Rev. Mariann Budde, during the prayer service at the National Cathedral on the day after the inauguration. She spoke from the "Canterbury Pulpit" in the cathedral, which, on its front has a stone carving of a disgruntled King John as he is forced to sign the Magna Carta, marking the first time power was taken from a king and given to the people.

"Millions have put their trust in you," Budde said, addressing the President, "and, as you told the nation yester-day, you have felt the providential hand of a loving God. In the name of our God, I ask you to have mercy upon the people in our country who are scared now." There were words of appreciation, even praise, for what she said. There were also words of condemnation from many, including from the President himself. In our divided nation and in our free nation, we should expect this.

What struck me in the discussion of all of this was an article in *The New York Times* reporting that those words "electrif[ied] some liberal churchgoers in an era dominated by conservative versions of Christianity." The title of the article stated: "Some Protestants Felt Invisible. Then Came Bishop Budde." Liberal Christianity does not make it into the news very often. We liberal Christians might feel invisible because we often make ourselves that way, ignoring the advice of Jesus as we hide our light under a bushel basket.

At Congregational UCC, one of our callings is to make ourselves visible—to show the community around us that we are people who show the mercy, love, and acceptance of God to all people. We are liberal Christians who recognize the intrinsic worth of each individual, in whom we see the image of God; who honor and seek to protect human dignity; who seek to create a culture of tolerance, solidarity, and the equal enjoyment of individual rights in our city, state, and nation. Again, that doesn't get a lot of press, so we have to make it known ourselves.

For several months last year, our Jefferson St. sign carried the message: "The Liberal Church You Have Been Looking For." That says much about who we are. As recently as the last Sunday in January, a visitor to worship told me they are looking for a liberal congregation. Here we are.

The old hymn, "Jesus Calls Us" was left out of our hymnal. (Don't get me started.) It tells us, "Jesus calls us o'er the tumult of our life's wild restless sea....saying "Christian, follow me." Let us continue to follow in ways that show others a way of faithful living that the media often misses or ignores or avoids.


#### 2025 NIGHT OF 1000 DINNERS
