#### Friends in Christ:

Over the past two months, news reports have been filled with stories of US government cuts in funding of health care and disaster relief efforts at home and abroad. The cuts seem to be on again/off again, but NPR reported that former USAID officials estimate the administration's actions will deprive 1 million children of food, 17.9 million additional people will contract malaria and 166,000 will die from it, tuberculosis cases will increase 28% and 28,000 people will get Ebola and other infections. Other nations are following the lead of the United States and planning cuts as well.

The need for money to fund medical care, disaster relief, and services for refugees has never been greater. As our government acts to deport millions and cut funds for humanitarian work around the world, our giving takes on an even greater importance this year.

For the past 10 years, Congregational UCC has been one of the top 50 givers to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering in the United Church of Christ. Last year we gave \$4,400 to this special offering that provides support for refugees, immigrants, and victims of natural disasters as well as ongoing health, education, and agricultural efforts nationally and globally.

We can do better.

Give generously to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering that we will receive during worship on Palm Sunday, April 13.

If you have already decided how much you are going to give, double that amount.

If you haven't yet decided, surprise yourself—shock yourself, even—with how generous you can be. When you write that check you should be asking, "What am I thinking, giving this much?"

I'm not asking you to give so that we will continue to be on that Top 50 list. We might be. We might not. But either way, refugees will have water to drink because of your giving; people who lost their homes in natural disasters will find shelter because of your giving; around the world women and men, boys and girls will get the health care they need and would otherwise miss because of your giving.

I'm asking you to give because Jesus calls those who would follow him to love God and love our neighbors. Those two great commandments of love are inseparable. Giving to meet human need is a ministry, a form of religious service open to all people.

I'm asking you to give because you glorify God by the generosity of your sharing. By letting your light shine, a little of the darkness is scattered and in that light people might find new life.

I'm asking you to give because you are stewards of all that you have received from God. You know that. Take some time to remember all the doors that have been opened for you, all the help that you have received to get to where you are today. Great need now meets your great abundance. How do you want to respond?

One final note: Our Church Council has approved my taking some sabbatical time again this summer. I will use the month of June to continue the writing project I began last summer. It worked well for both the church and me to take this creative approach. We are arranging guest preachers and pastoral care for this time. This way I can be here in July and August to continue the momentum that we have developed.

#### A SUSTAINABLE PALM SUNDAY

When children and adults wave palm branches during on Sunday, April 12 (Palm Sunday), they will be using palms that are harvested in ways that are sustainable and that help to improve local communities' standard of living.

We will be using Eco-palms. Eco-Palms are Chamaedorea palms, a non-oil palm used in many facets of life, including religious ceremonies and floral arrangements. The University of Minnesota Center for Integrated Natural Resources and Agricultural Management, working with the Rainforest Alliance TREES program and Smartwood, has established certification for a sustainable palm harvest in Mexico and Guatemala. Each plant produces two to five harvestable leaves over a two to four month period. Palm gathering actually protects valuable natural forests where palms grow. Many of these palm producing areas are important "biosphere reserves" and tend to be the home of poorer segments of the rural population.

Although US palm purchases may reach as high as \$4.5 million each year, the palm harvesters usually earn very little. Families and communities, who rely heavily on palm harvesting for income, represent the poorer segments of the rural populations in the palm-producing areas of Mexico and Guatemala. Eco-palms are harvested in a more sustainable way—harvesters are paid on the quality of their palms rather than the quantity. These communities are also committed to using harvesting practices that minimize the impact on the natural forest. Eco-palm harvesters and community members sort and package the palms themselves and sell their palms directly rather than relying on middlemen. In this way, eco-palms improve local communities' standard of living and ensure that the money paid for the palms benefit those who labor.







#### CHURCH STEWARDSHIP

Our Stewardship Board supports members and friends of The Congregational Church, United Church of Christ, Iowa City in developing the principles of Christian stewardship in their lives. The Board focuses on planning a yearly stewardship emphasis to raise funds for the coming year's budget. It is also charged with leading fundraising campaigns for specific projects, building needs, and new programs. The Board is also responsible for stewardship education to help members and friends understand how they can include The Congregational Church, United Church of Christ, Iowa City in their personal long-range financial plans.

Here is an aid to help you understand the different types of giving.

- **Annual Giving**—gifts to support the annual operating budget, by fulfilling a one-year pledge or estimate of giving made in the fall, or with direct budget donations during the year.
- **Planned Giving**—gifts from a member's accumulated resources and assets to the church's Endowment Fund or other designated or undesignated special funds for future ministries and mission.
- Capital Gifts—gifts for a specific purpose, such as building restoration or remodeling, new construction, or new programs.
- **Special Offerings**—typically a once-a-year gift to congregational offerings for a special cause, including annual UCC denomination-sponsored offerings (such as One Great Hour of Sharing) or gifts received for an immediate need, such as a natural disaster.
- **Memorial Gifts**—gifts made in memory of family members or friends upon their death. These gifts can be designated for a particular purpose or fund or be placed in the Memorial Fund for future use.

The Stewardship Board will share information about each of these giving options over the coming months. We hope you will find this helpful as you envision and consider your annual and future giving opportunities.

# JOHNSON COUNTY VETERANS FOR PEACE PUBLIC READINGS OF SPEECHES OF MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.—FRIDAY, APRIL 4 AN INVITATION FROM DONNA HIRST

For many years, the Johnson County Veterans For Peace has sponsored public readings of two important speeches of Martin Luther King, Jr. on the anniversary of his assassination. This year we will hold our readings on April 4, 11:00-6:00 at the Robert A. Lee Community Recreation Center, 220 S. Gilbert Street.

Members of our congregation can read a short segment of one of the speeches. Participation in this event by the Congregational Church would be an excellent way to publicly declare our solidarity with Dr. King's vision for peace in the world. In addition to UCC members, local government officials and the general public will be reading excerpts.

Folks are encouraged to drop by anytime between 11:00-6:00 to read a segment or to listen to the speeches.

The VFP acknowledgment of Dr. King's commitment to peace is one of the significant actions that VFP 161 takes each year. This event is an important way in which the chapter can lead the community in a public demonstration of our values and priorities -- values and priorities that the UCC shares.

Congregational UCC Director of Christian Education and visual art, Hope Spragg, is part of "Elusive Balance," a traveling group exhibition composed of Iowa Artist/Mothers that explores the challenges of finding balance within artist and mother/caregiver identities. As there is no one way to embody motherhood, there is a diverse range of artists and artwork. "Elusive Balance" opened on March 14 and will run through April 5 at Public Space One North Gallery, 229 N. Gilbert St, Iowa City.

This exhibition embraces the dichotomies found in motherhood: ideas of rest and productivity, contentment and overwhelm, stability and transition, responsibility and absurdity/play, and societal expectations vs. personal intuition. The pieces visually explore how one finds personal balance, or simply lets go of this elusive state, celebrating imbalance within life and art.

## UI LABOR CENTER CONFERENCE: WORKERS ON THE FRONTLINES OF A HOTTER PLANET

This conference will bring together Iowans from labor, environmental, civil rights, public health, and campus organizations to focus on one example of our interconnections – the struggle for worker safety in extreme heat. This free conference will be held Saturday, April 12 from 9am-3pm at the Iowa Memorial Union on the University of Iowa campus.


The keynote speaker is Jessica Martinez, co-Executive Director of the Council on Occupational Safety and Health (COSH). COSH is a national network that unites immigrant-led workers' centers, labor unions, occupational safety and health experts, public policy leaders, and educators in a movement for safe and healthy workplaces. Ms. Martinez has built groundbreaking coalitions that empower workers to secure critical workplace safety improvements and served on the National Advisory Committee on Occupational Safety and Health under President Obama's administration. The conference will also feature sessions on the science of heat, climate, and health led by University of Iowa professors Brandi Janssen and Charles Stanier; breakout sessions on worker safety organizing, heat policy, and community heat safety; and a panel on national and local initiatives that will include Charlotte Brody, Vice-President of Health initiatives with the national BlueGreen Alliance.
